Lawn Lake Dam

- 26 Feet Tall
- 498 acre-feet
- Remote (no road access)
- Built in 1903
- Crest elevation ~10,987 feet above sea level
- Failed July 15, 1982
- 3 Lives Lost
- Caused the subsequent failure of Cascade Dam
- ~\$31 Million in damages (1982 dollars)
- ~85.7 Million in damages (2021 dollars)


